# 2 ICBF Board Meeting


Some of the topics covered at ICBF's board meeting yesterday included:


- **Beef Genomics Scheme** − 30,000 tags have been issued to farmers for sample taking. The first 2,000 samples have been sent back by farmers, and this is expected to rapidly increase over the coming week.
- **4 Gene Ireland Beef** − There has been an excellent uptake by farmers on the straws from the AI bulls on the Gene Ireland Programme, which is very encouraging.
- **♣ Beef Breeding** An extensive discussion took place around the role that breeding has in dealing with the profitability issues on Suckler Farms, and how a more rapid implementation of the tools and infrastructure that are available can take place.


- ♣ The stats above are compiled with the assistance of DAFM AIM systems.
- BVD test results continue to be received at ICBF and are being processed accordingly. There have been 1,393,000 results received since January 1<sup>st</sup>, of which 102,000 have come in the last 7 days. Since the beginning of the voluntary phase in 2012, 4.06 million results have now been received.
- ♣ The graph below shows Inseminations recorded on AI Handhelds in 2013 compared with 2014.








- This week there were 340 weights received through the technician service and 1678 weights recorded by farmers.



The calving report has key performance indicators for your herd which allows you to compare your herd's performance with national averages and top performers.



### 7 Tully

#### **Recent Events**

Un Wednesday of this week 300 farmers from different BTAP groups around the country visited the G€N€ IR€LAND performance Test Centre, Tully, Kildare, Co. Kildare. This was the first of 4 events that ICBF will be hosting at Tully in 2014 for discussion groups. The event featured four main talks covering information on Beef €uro-Star Indexes, G€N€IR€LAND Maternal Breeding program, G€N€IR€LAND progeny test program at Tully and Genomics. As part of highlighting the importance of the G€N€IR€LAND Maternal Breeding







program a small number of pedigree and commercial cows were on display along with YCM (pedigree AI bull that was part of the G€N€IR€LAND spring program).

4 117 progeny (mainly sired by G€N€IR€LAND bulls) were also on display at the event, made up of 98 bulls and 19 steers. They progeny were in four separate groups which consisted of animals currently on-test (56 animals) and a new intakes which are due to commence test shortly (61 animals). These animals had individual performance and parentage information displayed which created a lot of interest and discussion among farmers. Overall the event was successful in fulfilling its objective, which was to update farmers on the latest developments in beef breeding that will allow for much greater rates of genetic improvement in Irish beef production and thus increase profitability on farms. I would like to thank all those who contributed to making the event a success. See below for photos of the event. The next events will take place on 11<sup>th</sup> June, 23<sup>rd</sup> July and 3<sup>rd</sup> September.

International At the event McDonalds representatives spoke to Slaney beef producers about their commitment to securing a sustainable future for Irish farming. They also spoke about their new sustainable beef program which aims to support existing farmers and help young farmers into the industry. This program is built around five core commitments spanning quality of ingredients, animal welfare standards, work and training opportunities for young farmers, environmental and efficiency standards, and knowledge sharing. Ger Cusack (Veterinary practitioner) gave a presentation on the prevention and controls for liver fluke and pneumonia in cattle, while Stephen Conroy gave an overview of the G€N€IR€LAND beef breeding program and the important role Tully plays in capturing accurate early information on progeny of test and well proven AI sires for traits which are collected routinely by the industry (i.e. carcass data) but also expensive and difficult traits to record such as feed intake & meat eating quality.

#### 8 Genetic Evaluations

Results for pedigree beef animals scored from 1<sup>st</sup> March up to the 15<sup>th</sup> April have had their evaluations updated on May 1<sup>st</sup>.

### **Beef Genomics Scheme**

♣ Ear tissue sampling kits for over 32,000 herds have been processed to date for the beef genomics scheme. The first tags arrived on farms on Monday. Just over 56,000 tags are on farm or will be on farm by next week. A







further 40,000 tags will be arriving on farm within the next two weeks. Already over 3300 samples have being received by Weatherbys DNA laboratory for processing. A picture of the first samples to arrive is shown below.

# 10 Sheep Ireland

#### **LambPlus**

- The deadline for submission of lambing data onto the Sheep Ireland database passed on Wednesday the 30<sup>th</sup> April. In the run up to the deadline there was a huge amount of activity on the website with breeders rushing to get data entered. From a practical point of view and from an evaluation point of view implementing this deadline has been a huge success. We are now on the front foot in terms of providing breeders with the best possible evaluations to help make early culling decisions. It also means that we have plenty of time to prepare for the upcoming ram sale season to ensure both breeders and breed societies have everything they need to provide the €tro-Stars to ram buyers.
- April 30<sup>th</sup> was also the deadline for LambPlus breeders to notify us of their intention to carry out ultrasound scanning for backfat and muscle. Our scanning season will begin with some of the early lambing Vendeen and Suffolk flocks very soon. We will be contacting all breeders by phone to organise suitable times and dates to collect this valuable data.

#### **Sheep Ireland Board Meeting**

- The Sheep Ireland Board met this week to hold its AGM. It was accepted that significant progress had been made in the 2013 year thanks in no small part to STAP. However there is still a huge amount of work to be done and the retention of STAP or a similar discussion group model was seen as critical to the future development of the breed improvement programme.
- ◆ Other major issues discussed included the format of the new €uro-Star Indices for the coming year. As a result of the changes we are making to our main Indices (changing from one Overall Sheep Value Index, to a split Terminal and Replacement Index), there will be scope to include additional important sub-Indices underneath our two main Indices. Making the decision on what sub-Indices to display is a difficult one, but we now feel that we have identified Indices that will be very useful to all farmers that use the €uro-Stars. These Indices will be visible in all ram sales catalogues in 2014.


