




2 Database





- ♣ The stats above are compiled with the assistance of DAFM AIM systems.
- BVD test results continue to be received at ICBF and are being processed accordingly. There have been 1,895,000 results received since January 1st, of which 25,000 have come in the last 7 days. Since the beginning of the voluntary phase in 2012, 4.56 million results have now been received.
- ♣ The graph below shows Inseminations recorded on AI Handhelds in 2013 compared with 2014.
- This week there were 749 weights received through the technician service and 1516 weights recorded by farmers. The graph below shows the week and year to date totals.

4 Genetic Evaluations

- ♣ All evaluations have commenced ahead of the routine August evaluation update on the 19th August.
- Research work is on-going in the areas of INTERBEEF, meat eating quality and liver fluke.

Beef Genomics Scheme

♣ Over 106,000 samples have been received in the lab. Currently the rate of sample return from farms is 90%. DNA and genotyping quality continues to be excellent with over 30,000 genotypes returned to ICBF from Weatherbys to date. Sampling kits for any outstanding herds will be processed next week.

Premier Sale season commences

The ram sale season is now kicking off around the country for all the breeds. The Vendeen Premier sale took place in Roscommon on Wednesday. An 80% clearance was achieved on the day which is excellent and this positive demand will hopefully bode well for the many upcoming Premier sales over the coming weeks.

Upcoming Sales

Tomorrow Saturday 26th July, the Irish Charollais sheep society will hold their premier sale in Tullow, Co. Carlow. The number of Sheep Ireland performance recorded entries in this sale will be at its highest level ever, emphasising the major growth in performance recording breeders in the breed. This rapid growth in performance recording breeders, has created some difficulties. With such a major influx of data from many new breeders, we are learning more about how the many different bloodlines are performing. This has inevitably caused movements in genetic Indices for many breeders. This coupled with the structural changes to the Indices themselves has resulted major updates to the CaroStars that were provided to some breeders in 2013.

2014 Charollais €uroStar evaluations

The evaluations that we are providing to Charollais breeders in 2014 are better than last year. The reason they are better is due to the fact that we are collecting far more data from many more different breeders. While this large increase in data collection has caused movements in the Indices, the Indices that are now being displayed are more accurate - more accurate for the commercial farmer buying the ram. We are currently trying to build a picture of how all the various bloodlines within the Charollais breed are performing. Up to now, making out this picture has been impossible due to the very small amount of data being recorded annually. Only now are we in a position where sufficient volumes of data are being generated to produce meaningful evaluations for the breed. This needs to continue for a number of years and we need to have the full backing of the Charollais society and their breeders to deliver significant genetic gain for the benefit of Irish sheep farmers.





FARM PROFILE Thomas & Bridget Murphy

Thomas and Bridget farm 92 ha with 150 suckler cows, all offspring are brought to slaughter. They are achieving a 348 day calving interval with 0.97 calves/cow/year. 70% of the heifers are calving at 22-26 months. How are they achieving this?

One of the key areas identified for improvement has been to increase milk in his cows so he has now purchased in beef heifers from the dairy herd. This approach will be discussed on the day and how the new Replacement Index can be used to breed replacements.



FARM PROFILE James & Mary Grace

James and Mary Grace farm 53 ha with 51 suckler cows. The bulls are sold as weanlings and the heifers are finished. They also purchase 30 dairy-bred calves which are brought to beef. This is an excellent opportunity to see how a dairy calf to beef enterprise complements suckler beef production and can be used to increase output and profitability.

One of the key areas identified for improvement has been soil fertility. James has soil sampled the farm and uses this to make out a fertilizer plan for each paddock. He also measures grass. This will be discussed on the day and how he uses this to manage grass.
