





ICBF Weekly Update 25th October 2013

- 1 Important Dates

- **4** The stats above are compiled with the assistance of DAFM AIM systems.
- In the Suckler scheme, the number of 2012 born calves with meal introduced is 664,367 with the number of animals weaned at 618,883.
- BVD test results continue to be received at ICBF and are being processed accordingly. There have been 2,039,000 results received since January 1st, of which 16,000 have come in the last 7 days. Since the beginning of the voluntary phase in 2012, 2.53 million results have now been received.
- **4** The graph below shows Inseminations recorded on AI Handhelds in 2013compared with 2012.
- This week there were 702 weights received through the technician service and 3901 weights recorded by farmers.

3 Test Day Model Implementation Postponed

- We have decided to hold the implementation of the Test day model for milk production traits and the base change pending further testing.
- This decision was based on some as of yet unresolved changes in bull proofs but also feedback from the industry regarding the latest set of test proofs circulated last week.







- The Irish data passed the INTERBULL Test run and therefore has a green light for implementation at the INTERBULL level. However any adjustments to that model even if they are minor will need to be submitted to the January test run in order to allow ICBF submit the new model to a routine run and subsequently use these international breeding values in official evaluations. The next INTERBULL test run is scheduled for January 2014 and it is anticipated that any revisions to the evaluation will be submitted at that stage.
- The reason for also holding the base change, is in case any changes made to the Test day model have an impact on the base animals which would then affect all proofs in subsequent evaluations post the December 2013 run.

4 HerdPlus®

- Ensure all serves and pregnancy data is added to the ICBF database before the 4th of November. This is to ensure that this data is included in the Pocket Notebook.

5 Genetic Evaluations

- As a result of the decision to withhold the implementation of the test day model proofs further testing on the proofs is underway. Any new changes will then be validated in the next Interbull test run in January.
- The deadline for data for the next routine evaluation is Monday. The schedule for the next evaluation is as follows:

6 Tully

4 There are currently 217 progeny (163 bulls and 54 steers) in Tully made up of 4 separate intakes.

Summary of intakes currently in Tully

- 87 bulls (dob: 1^{st} September 2012 31^{st} October 2012)
 - Starting test: 29th October 2013
- 46 bulls (dob: 1^{st} May 2012 31^{st} June 2012)
 - Started test: 2nd July 2013
 - Due to be slaughtered: 29th October 2013
- ✤ 30 bulls (dob: 1st July 2012 31st August 2012)
 - Started test: 28th August 2013
- 54 steers (dob: 1^{st} Nov $2011 31^{st}$ Dec 2011)
 - Started test: 1st August 2013
- The intake of 46 bulls have recently completed their 90 day performance test and will be slaughtered on Tuesday of next week. The following week will see the intake of 54 steers being slaughtered. 100 progeny are currently being sourced from farms to replace the progeny that are due to be slaughtered.

Recent events and groups at Tully

One of the new roles at Tully following the changeover to testing commercial progeny is to educate farmers and industry representatives on the recent develops in beef breeding. Therefore, a number of groups have been visiting the center on a weekly basis from individual farmers to organised tours. Last week Tully hosted the







ASA conference which was kindly sponsored by Dunbia (see pictures of the event below). The event covered the challenges beef farmers face in terms of increasing profitably and the important role that €uro-Star indexes (especially maternal), data from Tully and the G€N€IR€LAND Beef breeding programs have in helping the industry achieve a more profitably beef sector. Some other groups recently visiting Tully included farmer groups, forty final year Animal Science students from Wageningen University in Holland and Vets from UCD.

8 Sheep Ireland

- Final preparations for the upcoming 2014 LambPlus recording season are now being put in place here in Sheep Ireland. There will be a very strict deadline for signing up to LambPlus and this has been set for **December 15th** by the Sheep Ireland Board. Any breeders wishing to sign-up after this deadline will unfortunately have to wait until the following year. In the initial years of Sheep Ireland there was such an emphasis on getting ram breeders involved, deadlines were never high on the agenda. Such is the workload now that imposing strict deadlines for sign-ups and data entry will need to become a major part of the breed improvement programme. All breeders will receive ample warning as each deadline approaches so we do not anticipate any issues.
- Unlike the 'HerdPlus' service offered by the ICBF, the Sheep Ireland 'LambPlus' service operates on a very seasonal basis. Farmers can join HerdPlus at any time throughout the year. Unless we engage with a ram breeder in advance of the lambing season commencing then there is a chance that very important data will not be recorded properly. As many pedigree breeders commence lambing in mid-late December it is critical we impose our December 15th deadline. Letters are currently being prepared for circulation to all Irish pedigree breeders.

Round of regional LambPlus meetings

- ↓ The times, dates and venues have been finalised for our round of breeder meetings this Autumn (please see table below). These meetings will be a chance for all pedigree ram breeders (LambPlus and Non-LambPlus) to come along and discuss the breed improvement programme. The Sheep Technology Adoption Programme helped to put the €uro-Star evaluations on the map in 2013 and this programme will play a huge role for the genetic improvement programme for the coming year also.
- A strong attendance is critical at these meetings. The current sheep breed improvement is by no means the 'finished article', but we can only make progress through active engagement with the country's ram breeders. We will be circulating details of these meetings to all sheep breed societies and their members.

Sheep Ireland CPT mating for 2013

The Sheep Ireland Central Progeny Test (CPT) is an integral part of the sheep genetic improvement programme. The mating on these CPT flocks has just finished and was very successful again this year. In all just over 2100 ewes were artificially inseminated. A total of 43 high Index performance recorded pedigree rams were used







throughout the AI programme. These rams are carefully selected from existing performance recording flocks to help 'link' up as many pedigree flocks across the country as possible.

- 4 The CPT is also a fantastic source of commercial data for the €uro-Star evaluations. All the farms involved operate conventional grass based production systems and the CPT helps Sheep Ireland evaluate pedigree rams where it matters most on Irish commercial sheep farms.
- In the next number of days letters will be circulated to all ram breeders that kindly made rams available to our CPT programme. This letter will contain details on how many ewes were inseminated by their rams, if there were any issues with semen quality etc.




